



Volunteers in the Make a Mask campaign gathered donated materials and sewed over **1,800 masks** that were given to campus essential workers.


Debra Greszler, Manager of Information Resources in the Office of Information Technology, spearheaded the effort, for which she was named Staff Council Member of the Year.



The Office of Communications is the primary messaging source for matters related to COVID-19, including signage, websites, videos, news and updates.







University Housing provided students living on campus with masks and hand sanitizer.







Undergraduate and Graduate Enrollment










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
Federal Research Expenditures (millions)



Campus Landscape Enhancement: Phase 3


Phase 3 will enhance the pedestrian experience, improve signage at the entrances to campus, restore Cottonwood Creek and create a tree canopy through the campus core.




